Glossary	
Colour theory	The collection of rules and guidelines which designers use to communicate with users through appealing colour schemes in their work.
Complimentary colours	Two colors that are on opposite sides of the color wheel.
Positive print	A printed shape on a piece of material.
Negative print	The part of the material which does not have a print on it.
Perspective	the art of representing three-dimensional objects on a two- dimensional surface so as to give the right impression of their height, width, depth, and position in relation to each other.
abstract	Artwork that does not look like anything specific, creating its effect through shape and colour.
Graffiti	Graffiti is writing or drawings scribbled, scratched, or sprayed secretly on a wall or other surface in a public place.
Stencil	A thin sheet of card, plastic, or metal with a pattern or letters cut out of it, used to produce the cut design on the surface below by the application of ink or paint through the holes.
Tag	The signature of a graffiti artist.
Colour harmony	When two colours combine in a way that is pleasing to the eye.
Analogue colours	Three colours that are next to each other on a colour wheel, when used together they create colour harmony.
